

College Credit Plus FAQ

Q: Is College Credit Plus (CC+) intended to replace Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) A and B?

A: Yes, CC+ is intended to replace PSEO A and B. PSEO A provisions have been included in the CC+ recommendations (https://www.ohiohighered.org/college_credit_plus) as a pathway which will still permit a parent to pay for their child to attend a postsecondary institution and receive postsecondary credit.

Q: Are Early College High School (ECHS) programs included in the CC+ recommendations?

A: Yes, ECHS programs are addressed within the CC+ recommendations as outlined on page 19.

Q: As part of the CC+ recommendations nonpublic postsecondary institutions are addressed on page 10. Does that refer to private colleges and are they required to follow the same credentialing requirements that public postsecondary institutions are required to follow?

A: Yes, the recommendations are referring to private, non-profit institutions and they will be expected to follow the same credentialing requirements.

Q: Are funding scenarios (floor, ceiling, and in-between) that show the funding to the high school and funding to the Institution of Higher Education (IHE) available?

A: Yes, funding scenarios are outlined within the report on pages 12-15, but if there are any further clarifying questions Ohio Board of Regents (OBR) will be happy to address them.

Q: Will legislative changes need to occur to remove PSEO A and B as a state requirement.

A: Yes, legislative changes will need to occur in order to move from the PSEO structure to CC+. Language is anticipated to be introduced as part of the mid-biennial budget review process.

Q: For those PSEO MOUs that are already signed for next year, will these be honored?

A: OBR is aware of timing issues and has factored these concerns into the recommendations. The final decision on timing of the program, if adopted, will be determined by the legislature.

Q: How should institutions be preparing for this possible program transition?

A: All institutions should continue to follow existing guidelines and procedures. The Attorney General's office has also agreed to develop a CC+ agreement template for IHE use.
